

Corby Club Championships Part 2 9th, 11th and 16th September



Bethany Smyton followed her superb runs in the first part of the Corby AC Club Championships with a new club record and a third place National ranking over 600m in the second part. She raced home in 1.42.1 to erase Stephanie Cooper's Under-15 mark of 1.44.2 from 2002 to finish ahead of Celine Bangay (1.47.2).

Other good wins in the same age group came from Gaby Bangay, who leapt 4.45m in the long jump, putted 9.01m in the shot and clocked 28.0 over 200m.

In the corresponding boys' age group Scott Kendall was in excellent form when he took the 200m in a new best of 26.2 and also won the shot and long jump. Other wins came from Callum Logan (600m, 800m & 3000m) and Sam Baker, who ran 13.0 over the 80m hurdles.

Emma MacFarlane was prominent in the Under-13 Girls' section with wins in the 200m, 600m, 800m, 3000m and the long jump.



Pick of the Under-11s were the wins of Ella Brahmachari (200m & 800m) and Ruby Goodall, who landed a treble with victories in the 600m, 3000m and long jump while on the boys' side Alex Cotter (200m), Robbie McCall (600m & 3000m) and Fraser Dalby (800m & long jump) all impressed.



Jasper Larken was another to bag several titles with his successes coming in the 200m, 600m, 3000m, shot and discus. However he had to concede in the long jump when Brandon Armitage leapt a useful distance of 4.10m.

Nathan Graham clocked a new best of 24.1 to take the Under-17 200m and he also won the 600m while Ally Fowler – despite undergoing treatment for injury – won the 3000m in 10.39.5.

Lauren Boyd putted 9.91m to win the Under-20 shot but had to settle for second in the long jump when she finished just 2cms behind Katie Barry's winning mark of 4.50m.

Wilson Paterson ran a nippy 27.5 in the veteran 200m while Simon Franklin and Jack McShane performed well in the Under-20 age group. The former recorded times of 1.26.1 and 2.02.1 respectively in the 600m and 800m while McShane putted 11.44m in the shot and threw 32.96m in the discus.



There was some fine running in the women's 3000m which was won by veteran Maree Jesson, who clocked a new best of 11.18.3. In her wake the Under-15 pair of Celine Bangay and Charlotte Cotter (11.34.4) had a battle throughout with the former clinching it in the closing stages with her time of 11.28.4.
